'Working towards a better world forms the cultural foundation of this community'

Since the end of 2018, tech start-up Tykn has been part of the ImpactCity community in The Hague. The company has developed an innovative digital management system based on blockchain technology that enables public and private institutions to share, request and verify personal data.

This is essential for the 1.2 billion people worldwide that currently do not have access to their passports due to humanitarian disasters, wars or inefficient identity registration. Also, traditional means of identification are not only expensive but also highly sensitive to fraud. By making use of blockchain technology, it is possible to create a secure digital passport that holds sensitive information

pertaining to someone's identity. This means, for example, that refugees do not have to go through life 'invisibly'.

The office of Tykn is located in Apollo14, one of the innovation hubs of ImpactCity in The Hague.

'You really feel that working towards a better world forms the cultural foundation of this community. Working here is not only about figures and performance, and that gives us an extra boost of motivation', explains Jimmy Snoek, co-founder of Tykn. The start-up profits from the high amount of (international) NGOs in The Hague. 'ImpactCity offers us the possibility of short communication lines with the government, which is crucial when developing identification solutions. Also, we closely work together with a diverse range of international charity organisations, mostly also located in The Hague.'
